Novelist A.C. Frieden Explores Belgrade for Scenes in a New Thriller

BELGRADE, **Serbia (Sept. 19, 2010)** – Chicago-based author A.C. Frieden is spending part of his time in Belgrade, Serbia searching for scenes for a new novel. Frieden focused his search in three parts of the capital: the east bank of the Sava River; the Kalemegdan area with its fortress; and the area west of Republic Square, including Skamania Street, Boulevard Despot Stefani and vicinity.

Frieden walked through an old market in search of a possible location for a chase scene. The Baljoni market began operating in the late 1930s and is named after a well-known local Jewish merchant. The market is now also called Skadarlija, named after the quaint pedestrian street just west of the market. It has over 500 stalls offering produce, meat, fish, toiletries, luggage, kitchen items and other essentials. "It's an ideal place for either a hair-raising chase scene or an intriguing clandestine rendezvous," said Frieden, "so I'll decide after reviewing my notes and all the pictures."

Frieden walked along Terazije street and the area around the historical Hotel Balkan and Moskva Hotel, both of which were important venues in Belgrade's upper class in the early 20th century and also in espionage circles of the Cold War. Frieden also searched for scenes west of there, in the Zeleni Venac neighborhood toward the Sava River. Zeleni Venac borders the neighborhood of Savamala to the south, while the northern border is the Brankova street. The area was first developed as a remnant of the sloping defensive trench which surrounded the Kalemegdan fortress in the 18th century. Today, the area features many small businesses, apartment blocks and a large open-air market which began operating in 1924.

Frieden's other literary-related research in Belgrade focused on the NATO bombing in 1999, including the hidden truth behind the Chinese Embassy bombing and other espionage-related aspects of the conflict (see Press Release 100918PR1 for details).
