

Morocco Becomes A.C. Frieden's Latest Literary Research Focus

MARRAKECH, Morocco (Nov. 27, 2008) – Author-lawyer A.C. Frieden arrived in Marrakech, Morocco on November 24 to find scenes for a crime novel, as well as scenes and settings for an anthology contribution (also a mystery). "From the moment I headed into the Medina, the old quarter, of the city," said Frieden, "I realized that its unique architecture, rich history and mystical atmosphere would offer a wealth of materials for my fiction writing."


From his temporary abode at the lavish Riad Camilia, Frieden ventured through the Souks, the narrow alleyways filled with small stores, located in the Medina. He also researched other historically significant sites in the Medina, including the *Badii Palace*, the *Jemaa El Fna* market square, the *Madersa* mosque, the Royal Palace, and the most famous landmark, the *Koutoubia* mosque.





Frieden also visited more modern parts of Marrakech, outside the Medina walls, including the area around the high-end shopping areas long *Mohammed V* avenue and nearby streets, as well as the more distant *Palmerie* district, where most of the city's luxury villas, golf courses and resorts are located.

Having spent enough time in Marrakech, Frieden decided to cross the Atlas Mountains to the pre-Saharan plains in the east. His journey began at dawn along route P31 towards the snow-capped mountains and the town of Ouarzazate some 200km east. He crossed the Tizi-n-Tichka mountain pass half way along the journey and visited the historic village of Ait Ben Haddou and the town of Ouarzazate, including the Atlas Studios, which hosted scenes from a variety of well known movies, such as *Gladiator* and *Kingdom of Heaven*.


